

Message from the IGU Tourism Commission Chair

2021 was a busy and dynamic year for the Commission, in spite of the various challenges posed by the Covid-19 pandemic. Encouragingly, 2022 looks to be an even busier year for us, with several cutting edge Commission events taking place once more in face-to-face format. Our collaborations with other Commissions and other organisations also continue to build bridges between different parts of our global tourism geographies community, promoting collaborative ventures and research synergies to define possible geographical approaches to tourism challenges in a post-pandemic context.

At the time of writing, the IGC Centennial Congress is due to take place next month, face to face in Paris (with some hybrid sessions). The Paris congress will have a huge presence of IGU Tourism Commission sessions and other activities, including the Commissions Excellence Lecture, the Tourism Commission members meeting and a joint Commission-Tourism Geographies journal social event - we hope to see as many of you there as possible! Many of our members are also due to meet immediately prior to the Paris IGC for the Commission's Pre-Meeting in Wageningen, the Netherlands, which is shaping up to be a fantastic small scale event in a more informal setting (in keeping with the tradition of meeting before major IGU congresses).

Several events are also planned for later this year and in 2023, including the XVII International Colloquium of the Spanish Geographers Assocation AGE-IGU in Cuenca, Spain this October and a number of collaborations on IGU Thematic Conferences and with other IGU Commissions. The IGU Tourism Commission is very proud to announce that our former Chair, Emeritus **Professor Alan A.** Lew has been awarded the IGU's prestigious Lauréat d'Honneur 2022; this is the first time that the Lauréat has been awarded to a geographer specialising in tourism. The IGU Lauréat d'Honneur was established to recognize individuals who have achieved particular distinction or who have rendered outstanding service in the work of the IGU or in international geography and environmental research.

The IGU Tourism Commission is very proud to announce that our current Chair, **Dr Julie Wilson** (Open University of Catalonia UOC) has been awarded the 2022 **American Association of Geographers (AAG) Recreation, Tourism and Sport Specialty Group's John Rooney Award** for outstanding contributions to the field and discipline of applied recreation, tourism and sport geography. Dr Wilson was previously awarded the AAG-RTS Specialty Group's Roy Wolfe Award in 2019.



IGU Tourism Commission IGC 2022 Pre-Meeting Wageningen, the Netherlands, 15th-17th July 2022

Time for Tourism Geographers

In line with previous IGC events, the Commission will maintain its tradition of holding a a premeeting prior to the main congress. This year's pre-meeting aims to highlight Time for Tourism Geographers, in line with the theme of the centennial congress of the IGU in Paris that immediately follows (theme: Time for Geographers). The theme of the pre-meeting will be around the research agenda of tourism geographers and its policy relevance on regional and national levels.

The aim of the pre-meeting is to provide a platform for debating current research in tourism geographies and how it makes an impact. We encourage various perspectives on all issues addressed within tourism geographies. We also hope for a wide attendance in order to fulfil one of the purposes of the IGU, i.e. to facilitate learning by not only comparing different places, but also different approaches and traditions.

The IGU Commission for the Geography of Tourism, Leisure and Global Change, in cooperation with the Cultural Geography Group of Wageningen University & Research, are happy to invite the global community of tourism geographers to Wageningen in the Netherlands. This meeting is organized as a pre-event to the IGU Centennial Conference in Paris, 18th-22nd July 2022. Hence, participants are encouraged to take part in the Paris event too.

The pre-meeting will take place in three locations. It will start with a Friday final workshop of the critical tourism studies PhD summer school run by the Centre for Space, Place and Society (CSPS), engaging with around 20 PhD candidates from around the world on how to problematize the relation between tourism and its material and socio-cultural setting. This will be on the campus of WUR. On the second day we will explore the Hoge Veluwe national park and the ways in which Dutch nature based solutions are being presented to tackle challenges of climate change, biodiversity loss and urban sprawl invariably evoking the role of leisure and recreation in these planning and design interventions. Therein we will have papers presented by participants. The third day is in Amsterdam, where we explore the issues of overtourism and how it is to be addressed.






Landscape and Tourism, Landscapes of Tourism. This collective volume -edited by IGU Tourism Commission Board Member Prof. Theano S. Terkenli (University of the Aegean) engages with contemporary scientific advances in the interdisciplinary scientific area of Landscape and Tourism. It represents the product (special issue) of a series of research studies published in the journal Land, aiming to enhance interdisciplinary dialogue on the multifaceted and complex relationship Landscape-Tourism, highlighting pertinent contemporary issues and future challenges, and establishing the significance of development of relevant theory, epistemology, empirical application, policy and ethics. This open-access volume comprises of 16 research articles and an Editorial article on the Landscape-Tourism interrelationship, coming from and/ or representing applications in various countries and covering the entire spectrum of such contemporary scholarly inroads. https://www.mdpi.com/books/pdfview/book/4757

Recentering Tourism Geographies in the 'Asian Century'. Edited By Harng Luh Sin, Mary Mostafanezhad and IGU Tourism Commission Board Member Joseph M. Cheer (Routledge, 2022), this book considers what the transition into the Asian Century means for some of the most urgent issues in the world today, such as sustainable development, human rights, gender equality, and environmental change. The book critiques Anglo-Western centrism in tourism theory and calls on tourism scholars to make radical shifts toward more inclusive epistemology and praxis.







Progress in French Tourism Geographies: Inhabiting Touristic Worlds (Springer, 2021) Edited by Mathis Stock, this groundbreaking book provides an overview of the recent progress in Francophone tourism geography, including a contribution from IGU Tourism Board Member Prof. Dominic Lapointe. It focuses on the theoretical advances in social and cultural geography, whereby the symbolic dimensions of tourism and the creation of tourism worlds are key.

Frontiers in Sustainable Tourism is a recently launched high visibility and quality journal, publishing rigorously peer-reviewed research across the social and physical sciences and the humanities dealing with the core issue of the sustainability of tourism and human mobility. Field Chief Editor Prof. Michael Hall at the University of Canterbury is supported by an outstanding Editorial Board of international researchers, including IGU Tourism Board Members Prof. Dominic Lapointe / Dr. Joseph Cheer and Former Chair Prof. Jarkko Saarinen. This multidisciplinary open-access journal aims to be the journal of record for research on tourism and sustainability and is at the forefront of disseminating and communicating scientific knowledge and impactful discoveries to academics and researchers, industry leaders, policymakers, and the public worldwide.
